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# Spirit of Santa Paula Ventura County, California

Spirit of Santa Paula opened in 2002 with the desire for meeting unmet needs in their rural community of 30,000 people. During the first few years they were open, they

provided a hodgepodge of assistance with food, dry goods and connected people to city and county services. The founders had good intentions but did not anticipate their organization would become a key service provider in these challenging times.



In 2008, as in many communities, homelessness was invisible. Abruptly, light shown on the reality of homelessness in Santa Paula; the community was shocked to find a homeless man dead in a local church. Spirit of Santa Paula responded, within a couple weeks, they began offering regular pantry services and a year later, they opened their first homeless shelter. The organization continues meeting the needs of their community, in addition to pantry and shelter services, they offer mental health services and hot meals through their Many Meals program.
